WHWB Board – Help Wanted

WHWB has made and delivered <u>thousands</u> of layettes by volunteers since its WHWB origin. The organization's officers volunteer to take care of the business side of WHWB. These same ladies help staff the Baby House on Tuesday and Friday. Quite frankly, they are fatigued and wish that others might step-up to serve on Board.

Sewing, knitting, crocheting, and quilting skills are <u>not required</u> to serve on the BofD. We need a webmaster for our website, officers for Board of Directors, delivery people, volunteers to sort and stock supplies at the Baby House. Volunteers are not just women, men are welcome. You can see by the following In Memory section that a gentleman volunteer worked with WHWB for years.

In Memory

Theron Bredeson, a volunteer with WHWB for over 20 years, died on January 18, 2024. Theron's volunteering started by driving his wife, Glenda, to the Baby House/team meetings and transporting sales items to craft shows. About twelve years ago, he retired from his job with Jefferson County Schools, telling his coworkers he was going to work for the babies. Theron immediately became the WHWB jack of all trades. He continued to transport Glenda, but he also became the general maintenance man at the Baby House, which included replacing shelving, moving things around, lifting heavy items, fixing toilets, and taking out the trash. Theron ordered supplies and picked them up. These items included bottles, toiletries, batting, fabric, and snaps, and he even stored extras in his garage when there wasn't room at the Baby House. Theron also handled all of our mail including picking it up from the post office box and delivering it to the Baby House, and he made deliveries to Brighton each week. For Arvada workgroup meetings, Theron would set up and take down the tables and chairs. He loved seeing all of the volunteers as he helped in any way he was needed. Although definitely not a knitter or sewer, Theron's contributions to showing love and support to WHWB and the babies of Colorado were second to none. Many volunteers looked forward to seeing him. From his big smile and warm hugs, his kindness and hard work, to his dedication to his wife and what she loved, Theron was loved by all of us.

Special Needs for WHWB

It is no secret that costs for almost everything is rising. While much of the materials for items in the layettes are donated, there is a great need for money. The standard requirements of Baby House rent, utilities, insurance, and supplies are all increasing. Purchased items such as bottles, lotion, diapers, etc. that are included in the layettes are more expensive.

Consider sources of monetary donations from organizations you belong to such as church groups, benevolent associations, and neighborhood groups, foundations that offer grants, or workplace matching funds or their charities.
